Dear Child Care Professionals of Georgia:

I am writing today to share news that I am excited about. Over the summer we convened two new CAPS advisory councils to listen to the experiences and needs of our two most important stakeholder groups, providers and families.

CAPS is a large system. More than 50,000 children from about 35,000 families have active scholarships. More than 250 DECAL employees keep the system running, administering regular payments to almost 3,000 providers and processing more than 66,000 scholarship applications in a year.



For as long as CAPS has been housed at DECAL, we have created opportunities to collect input from stakeholders, and it has been important to me to establish an ongoing feedback loop so that we can keep our stakeholders in the forefront as we make continuous updates to the system.

I was surprised by the number of child care providers who applied to be on the provider council, and we are grateful that so many of you expressed the willingness to take time from your busy days to collaborate with us.

Both advisory councils have 12 members, two people from each of the six geographic regions around the state. The provider council includes members from large corporate centers, smaller independent centers, and family providers, from both rural and urban areas.

In our first meeting with the provider council, we learned that you are very interested in the details of CAPS policies and processes, and we began a dialogue that will lead to specific policy recommendations from providers. We also committed to simplifying the language we use in our forms and letters to make these more accessible for providers and families.

Thank you for your commitment to high-quality early education for all children. It is a privilege to serve you.

## From the Director's Chair: Ideas, Information & Resources

#### **Important Child Care Director Resources**

No matter what stage you find yourself in in your career, it's important to have access to resources to support your professional growth. This is especially true for the field of early learning because it's all too easy to get stuck in our own little bubbles. Your bubble might be a small in-home family child care program, or it might be a large center with several classrooms, but it's still a bubble. Here are our recommendations for essential child care director resources.

#### **Your State Licensing Office**

You might not immediately think of licensing as a resource for you, but you should. Their role is to help ensure safe environments for young children. Their job is to stay up-to-date on the most recent rules and regulations that child care programs must follow and communicate those out to you. These rules can sometimes feel confusing or overwhelming, which is why your licensing office should be considered a resource. You should be able to ask them for help about how to put certain things into practice.

#### **Professional Early Learning Organizations & Their Conferences**

NAEYC (the National Association for the Education of Young Children) and NAFCC (the National Association of Family Child Care) are two of the largest professional organizations in the field of early learning. They both put on annual conferences, accredit high quality early learning programs, and publish helpful resources on best practices and new research. You can become a member of one or both (depending on the type of program you run), and gain access to some valuable information to help you grow as a professional. It might be out of your budget to attend their annual conferences every year, but if it's possible, prioritize attending at least once. Both conferences are jam-packed with high quality sessions on every topic you can imagine. It's an amazing way to re-energize and reinvigorate your love for all things early learning. NAEYC also has state chapters, which put on their own smaller-scale conferences. If flying to the national conference isn't in your budget, driving to your state's own conference might be. In terms of impactful child care director resources, these are at the top of the list.

#### **Finding Your Community**

Learning from your peers is a powerful experience in any profession and is why conferences happen in the first place. This kind of community learning shouldn't be limited to once a year, or who can afford to attend a conference. Whether it's to have a group to ask advice from, gripe with, or community is important for everyone. With so many forms of social media, you can find online communities in so many different places-Facebook, Pinterest, Twitter, Instagram, Reddit, just to name a few. You can also look to more local early learning organizations. Your local resource and referral agency, for example, might provide opportunities for the community to come together.

#### **Connect With Your Local Resource & Referral Agency**

Resource and referral agencies function differently depending on where you're located, but they are typically great child care director resources, offering training, subsidy support, and licensing support. If your state has a quality rated program for child care, it is usually through your resource and referral agency that you'll be able to enroll. Quality rated programs are ways to showcase the hard work of child care providers, creating a path to showcase growth and development as an early educator and care provider.

#### **Find Business Idols, Too!**

As a director it's not just about the ECE stuff, it's also about the business stuff, which, depending on your personality, might not be the fun stuff. At the end of the day though it doesn't matter how high quality your program is if the business side of things isn't sustainable. For many people we would rather bury our heads in the sand than think about the nitty gritty business decisions, but you'll only be hurting yourself. Finding child care business professionals who can answer your questions, advise you, and help you set goals can help you resist the urge to ignore it. You might accomplish this by developing a good relationship with your tax prep person and going to them with any questions you have.

The Georgia Department of Early Care and Learning (DECAL) announced that in order to deliver more integrated customer service to Georgia families, the 1-877-ALL-GA-KIDS toll-free child care search and referral help line is now operated by the agency's new Quality Rated (QR) Family Support Call Center.

The DECAL referral specialists in the QR Family Support Call Center, who began answering calls on July 1, 2025, deliver the services families have always received when calling 877-ALL-GA-KIDS (1-877-255-4254), including information on the benefits of high-quality child care, referrals to Quality Rated providers matching their preferences, and help with the enrollment process at the programs they choose. Now, the Call Center team can also personally connect families to colleagues across the agency who will help them access other beneficial early care and education information and supports from DECAL.

These enhanced services from the QR Family Call Center are available in English, Spanish, and other languages.

"We created the QR Family Support Call Center to give families who call the 1-877-ALL-GA-KIDS phone line more comprehensive and streamlined assistance with their questions and requests regarding child care," said DECAL Commissioner Amy Jacobs. ## The Family Gathering: Ideas, Information, & Resources for FCCLHs

## Supporting School-Age Children as a Family Child Care Learning Home

There are a variety of creative strategies and techniques that can be used to provide a supportive environment for the school-age children in your program. When thinking about how to keep this group of children engaged, consider the following:

- Establish a Routine: Create a consistent transition to help things go smoothly when children leave for and arrive from school. This is not only helpful for the school-aged children but also allows the other children in your care to understand what will happen during these times, thus making transitions uneventful and easy for all.
- Encourage Independence: Have materials accessible to help with completing homework, doing crafts, and other fun activities. If these are not age-appropriate for other children in your care, create a space that allows your school-agers access without the worry of safety hazards for younger children. Invite the school-age children to help create a daily schedule that will keep them motivated to complete homework but also allow them to relax after a day at school or play to run off pent-up energy.
- Offer both independent and group activities/materials: Make sure that children can choose to participate in a way that meets their own needs daily. Have some areas for independent reading, activities, etc, while also providing for fun group games and play for those who would enjoy it.
- Utilize the abilities of the children: Encouraging the school-age children to interact positively with the younger children will not only benefit the group but could also benefit you. Having them read books to the younger children or facilitate a game or activity can take this off your hands and allows you to see to other children or tasks like getting a snack or talking with a parent. The children can enjoy each other's company and develop positive relationships, which also makes daily interactions easier and more enjoyable.
- Stay informed: Keep up with educational resources and support systems for each child. Create partnerships with other support adults for the children. In addition, do not skip out on taking professional development to help you learn more strategies and techniques that will help you support school-age children.
